### **Chloe Rockets to Regionals**

She also takes our first post-covid club records

Fifteen swimmers travelled to Plymouth for the Christmas Splash event, in search of PBs, medals and county qualification times.

However it was to be more than that for Chloe, who broke through the regional barrier in her first event, swimming the 400 Freestyle in 5:08. Yet better was to come later in the 100 Breaststroke, as she won her heat in a time of 1:25, qualifying her to regionals again, while also becoming the first Kingfisher to break a club record post-covid.

The club records and regional times then continued to flow, her best performance coming in the 200 Breaststroke, an amazing time of 3:02 that has given her a national ranking of 68th. In the 100 Breaststroke, she is 86th.

The meet also proved to be a memorable one for her sister Faye, who won a special award in the 10 and under girls category. Read on to find out more!











# **Xmas Splash: More County Times!**

Over 70 county times have been achieved by 13 swimmers ahead of the 2024 County Championships.

The swimmer achieving the **most new times** was Oliver Douglas, who increased his tally from 3 times to 8 times.

The event with **most new qualifications** was the **100 Butterfly**, with times achieved by Lexie Gomm, Lucas Quiggin and Oliver Douglas.

Danny Clack deserves a shout out for completing a clean sweep of qualifications for the breaststroke events. As did Jack Sagar, who qualified in the 200, even though he hated it! Jack will concentrate on the 50 and 100 in future.

You have to wonder why we have so many breaststroke specialists at the club? Could it have anything to do with our head coach being a national age-group breaststroke finalist? Maybe...

It had been a brilliant but unfortunate meet for Oliver McKinlay. His rise from bronze squad in April to the fastest lane in silver squad should serve as inspiration for anyone in the club. Progress can happen quickly.

Yet getting a county time looked like being a stretch too far. It started with the 100 Freestyle, an enormous five second PB from a month ago at the Club Championships. Yes, that's five seconds in just one month, thanks to an improving leg kick and improving turns! Yet he missed out on the county time by half-a-second.

Then came the 200 Freestyle. A twelve second PB! But again, he missed out on a county time by half-a-second.

Late on Sunday evening, Ollie's hopes rested on the 50 Freestyle. The hardest of the three qualification times. Yet he pulled it out of the bag, an amazing sprint getting him under the mark by two tenths of a second. Congratulations!

### 6 golds won by 4 swimmers

Chloe, Faye, Emilia and Ethan claim top prize

Chloe's efforts in the 100 and 200 Breaststroke, described on Page 1, were also gold medal winning swims. Ethan Clack also won two golds in breaststroke events, while edging closer towards a regional qualifying time of his own.

Emilia McKinlay has had a breakthrough year in competitive swimming and her success continued with gold in the 100 Freestyle. She will face tougher opposition at the County Championships, but a medal there is not beyond her reach. The same could be said of an improving Faye Morris, whose smile almost hit the roof when it was confirmed she won gold in the 200 IM.

Faye and Emilia swim in the same age group, but currently have very different strengths. They are both marvellous young role models for our youngest swimmers to get involved and give open meets a go.

#### Personal bests for everyone... almost!

Danny Clack, Lexie Gomm, Oliver Douglas, Fabiano Noto, Lucas Quiggin, Jack Sagar, Jess Stewart, Gracie White and Sophie White all found PBs at the meet. It was only Aaron Lansdale who missed out by a very small margin!

This event is hosted by Dinnaton and Caradon swimming clubs at Plymouth Life Centre on the **16th and 17th of March**. We're big supporters of this event here in Kingsbridge, and look forward to entering relay teams for the first time.

The two largest clubs in the area, Plymouth Leander and Mount Kelly, are not invited to this competition, meaning that more medals can be won by other clubs (such as ourselves).

22 swimmers have had their applications put forward to the meet organisers. Confirmation of acceptance will soon be sent by email. The event is your last chance of achieving a regional time for 2024, and your first chance of achieving a county time for 2025.

We're excited that many younger swimmers will be making their debuts at the event, pending their entries being accepted. Getting experience at this meet will help prepare them for more at the Devon Development and Sprint Galas in June.

The role is perfect if you are comfortable with spreadsheets and invoices, and if you wish to help out the club. Many parents have taken on this role since the club's inception in 1998.



**The big 50m pool awaits!** 13 of our swimmers have made the cut this year, their faces pinned up on our club notice board for you all to see. How will they fare against the fastest swimmers in the county in long-course competition?

Devon is a tough county to swim in. We share Devon with some strong clubs, two of whom have been national champions in the Arena League. Plymouth Leander are the Manchester City of swimming, whereas some of the top swimmers in Europe choose Mount Kelly for their education. **Just to qualify is a great achievement,** but how many of our swimmers can go a step further?

The top 8 in each age-group in the heats qualify for FINALS. Then it's a race for the medals. Last year, Kingfishers won no medals. Can that change in 2024? We sure hope it can! Racing begins with the 100 IM on the evening of Saturday 13th January.

### Annual Fees for 2024 are due this month





It's that time of year again. Our treasurer will soon be sending out emails (if she hasn't already) detailing our annual membership fees. They are due this month and are separate to your session fees that are paid by standing order.

Below is an explanation of each fee and where your money goes.

**KKSC Membership Fee:** £12 per swimmer + £12 for 1 parent if swimmer is under the age of 18. This goes towards admin expenses, such as printing and software costs that are critical for our Club Championships and any friendly gala we host.

**Swim England Fees:** £15.65 if you are not taking part in Open Meets. You may still be selected for friendly galas! It is £39.00 if you **are** taking part in Open Meets. These are to keep Kingfishers affiliated to the national swimming body and our insurance. The rate of £39 covers insurance in competitions beyond Quayside.

- > Some events pay your travel costs
- > Homemade cakes are often supplied during the breaks
- > You can disqualify your children's rivals.

Being a swim official is free from the abuse of football and free from the mud of rugby. We're compelled to bring a certain number of officials to Devon swimming events, and post-covid we've not been fulfilling that requirement. For years we've had Mel Jeynes, but he can't go on forever! Adam Stewart and now Will Rawlinson have helped plugged the gaps, and we're very thankful for them, **but more of you are still desperately needed.**
